Cayce Museum Opens New Exhibit

On September 19th, 2024, the Cavce Historical Museum opened its newest exhibit: "The Currency of Ruin: Confederate Banknotes Series Seven printed in Columbia, SC from 1863-1865," As the name implies this exhibit is an introduction to Civil War currency. It also highlights other local Civil War places and events. Almost all the bills displayed in the exhibit were printed, signed and even hand-cut in nearby Columbia, SC during the Civil War. The Midlands Coin Club and Larry Whitener and the Whitener Family donated the bulk of the seventh series of Confederate banknotes that are on display. Leaphart Supply donated many of the plastic protective covers for the currency. Many thanks to all our

To recognize the opening of the new exhibit the Museum hosted a reception, that included President William Gragg of the Midlands Coin Club, highlighting important aspects of the printing of the bills, a viewing of the exhibit, and a small reception. The currency exhibit is now a permanent fixture in the Cayce Historical Museum. The museum is open Tuesday to Friday 9am to 4pm and Saturday 10am to 2pm. Blake is a veteran police officer who currently serves as the Chief Deputy of the Buncombe County Sheriff's Office in Asheville, North Carolina and will officially join the Cayce team on October 17, 2024.

Chief Blake has had an extensive career in law enforcement, serving as the Police Chief of the Hendersonville Police Department for 13 years, preceded by seven years as the Police Chief of the Loris Police Department. A native of South Carolina, he began his career as a police officer in the Town of Ridgeland.

- Thursday, December 5 at 6 p.m. Christmas in Cayce Tree Lighting Ceremony, City Hall. Tips for Preventing Frozen Pipes

As the weather cools down, here are some important tips to help keep your pipes from freezing over.

- Keep cabinet doors open under faucet. This allows warm air to circulate evenly. Make sure to remove household cleaners and chemicals to keep kids and pets safe!
- Let faucets drip. Drips prevent ice from forming inside the pipes. Allow all faucets to drip when the temperature really takes a dip. This helps prevent pressure building up inside the pipes that can cause them to burst. To conserve, place a bucket underneath the faucet to reclaim the water.
- Insulate pipes. Pipe insulation and outdoor spigot covers are available at home improvement stores, and they are an inexpensive way to prevent freezing. Heating tape can also be used.
- Disconnect Garden Hoses. Disconnect, drain and store hoses for the winter months. Also, drain lawn irrigation lines by following the
- Keep a consistent temperature in the house even when away. Keep the thermostat at a minimum of 55 degrees when you're not home.
- Seal air leaks and keep garage door down. This will keep cold air out and warm air in.
- What if my Pipes Freeze? If your pipes do freeze, turn off the main water supply if possible, and call (803)796-9020 option 3 during operating hours (M-F 8:30am – 5pm) or press option 8 after 5pm, on weekends and holidays.
